BUTTERFLY CHECKLIST ELINOR KLAPP-PHIPPS PARK

Elinor Klapp -Phipps Park boasts a greater diversity of butterflies, over 80 species sighted since 2001, than any other site of its size in Florida. Many species are uncommon or rare. More than 50 species have been seen each month from April to September. During these warmer months, hundreds of individuals, representing 30-40 species, can often be seen in a day. Butterflies occur throughout the park and can be found in open fields and sunny spots along shared use dirt road trails. Some prefer shady areas along roadsides, but only a few tolerate dense shade sometimes found along narrow hiking trails. Butterflies drink nectar from wildflowers and often are seen on or near wildflowers, including "weedy" species without classic showy blooms.

This checklist includes all species known to occur in the park. Numbers, after the scientific name , indicate the months when the adult butterflies have been seen (1=January, 2=February, etc.). A letter at the end indicates the frequency of sightings by an experienced observer searching most of the park during this flight period.

A = ABUNDANT, ALMOST ALWAYS SEEN.

C = COMMON, OFTEN SEEN.

U = UNCOMMON, SOMETIMES SEEN.

R = RARE, VERY SELDOM SEEN.
