SUBJECT: Consideration of the City of Jacob Funding Request

Recommendation

Staff recommends the Governing Board approve a one-time funding request of \$4,000 to the City of Jacob to complete inspection and maintenance of two water storage tanks.

Discussion

In April 2016, the District received a letter from Mr. Carl Bailey, the City Manager for the City of Jacob, requesting financial assistance with a tank inspection for their potable water system. The tank inspection is a periodic regulatory requirement of utilities with water storage systems. The District coordinated with the city, the city's consultant, Florida Rural Water Association and the Department of Environmental Protection to work toward a solution to the city's request. The FRWA developed an asset management plan that identified both the short- and long-term funding needs for the system. The asset management plan identified that completion of the tank inspection would meet the regulatory requirements of the city's potable water system for the next five years.

Jacob City Water System

Jacob City is a small city located in northwestern Jackson County, Florida. The 2015 University of Florida Bureau of Economic and Business Research estimate for total population was 228 people. The city partnered with USDA Rural Development and completed construction of a new potable water system in 2011. The system withdraws water from two Floridan aquifer wells and distributes through 2"-6" PVC non-looped piping to approximately 84 customer connections. The system has two storage facilities: one 150,000 gallon elevated storage tank and one 6,000 gallon hydropneumatic tank. A standard regulatory requirement of potable water systems with elevated storage is to have the tanks inspected by a Florida certified engineer every five years. This is the first time the city has had to meet this regulatory requirement.

Financial Need

Like many small communities in northwest Florida, the City of Jacob has limited revenues to operate its potable water system. The potable water system cost an estimated \$1.2 million to complete, most of which was provided by a USDA Rural Development grant. A debt service of approximately \$264,000 remains with a scheduled payoff date of 2049. Without the debt service payment, the water system generates more than enough revenue to operate and maintain the system and to set aside approximately \$12,000 to a reserve fund for operation, maintenance and capital expenditures. With the annual debt service payment of \$15,480, however, the total expenditures of the water system annually exceed the revenues collected.

Section 373.705, F.S., directs the water management districts to focus on water supply planning and projects that develop water sources; however, the statute also authorizes districts to provide water supply development assistance. Water supply development is defined as "the planning, design, construction, operation, and maintenance of public or private facilities for water collection, production, treatment, transmission, or distribution for sale, resale, or end use" (Section 373.019(26), F.S.). Funding is available for this request through cost-savings realized from completed water supply development grant projects.

SUBJECT: Consideration of Additional Funding for the City of DeFuniak Springs' Red Eye

and Widner Circle Waterline Loop Project

Recommendation

Staff recommends the Governing Board approve additional funding in the amount of \$39,981 for the City of DeFuniak Springs' Red Eye and Widner Circle Waterline Loop Project and authorize the Executive Director to enter into an agreement with the city to provide funding not to exceed a total of \$93,136 for this project.

Background

In November 2016, the Governing Board approved the City of DeFuniak Springs' Red Eye and Widner Circle Waterline Loop project in the amount of \$53,155. Upon development of the scope of work for the project, the city's engineer revised the original estimate of the length of pipe needed to complete the project. The city is requesting additional funds to replace an additional 900 linear feet of 6" water pipe over that originally proposed, creating a looped water system for this neighborhood. A comparison summary of the original and proposed project components is included as Table 1.

Grant funding remains available from cost savings realized upon the completion of other water supply development grant projects. This funding is consistent with sections 373.703 and 373.705, Florida Statutes (F.S.), which state water management districts may provide assistance for water supply development to local governments and utilities.

SUBJECT: Consideration of ITB 17B-008 for Well Construction and Aquifer Performance

Testing of the Claiborne Aquifer

Recommendation

Staff recommends the District award a contract to the qualified bidder that submitted the lowest bid for the Claiborne Aquifer Well Construction and Aquifer Performance Testing and the Governing Board authorize the Executive Director to enter into an agreement to perform the work.

Background

The Claiborne aquifer project is part of the State's and the District's ongoing efforts to protect Jackson Blue Spring and Merritts Mill Pond. The project will evaluate the aquifer's viability as an alternative water source to offset demand on the Floridan Aquifer, making additional water available to springs. The cost for this project is included in the adopted FY 2016 – 2017 budget and is funded by a Florida Department of Environmental Protection Springs Restoration Grant.

On February 1, 2017, the District issued an Invitation to Bid (ITB) 17B-008 for construction and aquifer performance testing to assess the feasibility of the Claiborne aquifer as a water supply source in northern Jackson County. Current plans are to utilize the former Coast Guard Station located approximately two (2) miles northwest of the Town of Malone. The work in this ITB includes construction of a 450-foot deep Claiborne test well, a 450-foot deep Claiborne aquifer monitor well, and a 180-foot deep Floridan aquifer monitor well. The wells will be used to conduct an aquifer test to assess the productivity of the Claiborne aquifer and effects of Claiborne aquifer pumpage on the Floridan aquifer. Optional work, which may be performed at the direction of the District, includes coring, geophysical logging, construction of an additional monitor well, and well abandonment following the completion of testing activities.

On March 2, 2017, at 2:00 p.m. ET, the District will conduct the bid opening for ITB 17B-008. The results of the bid opening will be provided in a supplement for consideration by the Governing Board at the March 9, 2017, meeting.

SUBJECT: Consideration of a Requisition for the Florida Geological Survey to Perform

Work in Support of the Claiborne Aquifer Feasibility Evaluation

Recommendation

Staff recommends the Governing Board approve a requisition in the amount of \$75,938.00 for the Florida Geological Survey (FGS) to provide hydrogeologic services in support of the Claiborne aquifer feasibility evaluation.

Background

The Claiborne aquifer project is part of the State's and the District's ongoing efforts to protect Jackson Blue Spring and Merritts Mill Pond. The project is to determine the aquifer's viability as an alternative water source to offset demand on the Floridan Aquifer, making additional water available to springs. The cost for this work is included in the adopted FY 2016 – 2017 budget and is funded by a Florida Department of Environmental Protection Springs Restoration Grant.

The FGS has agreed to partner with the District to perform work and collect information at the Claiborne aquifer test site in northern Jackson County to enhance understanding of the hydrogeology of the area. The information gathered from their work will be used to facilitate decision-making regarding optimal total depths and cased depths for subsequent construction of a Claiborne aquifer test well and monitor wells. Other well construction and testing will commence in late spring and will utilize a commercial water well contractor.

The District and the FGS have a mutual interest in collecting information about the geologic formations and aquifers within northwest Florida. There is relatively little information available regarding the Claiborne aquifer and work on this site will provide data that benefits both agencies. The FGS, with its extensive history of conducting geologic and hydrogeologic investigations throughout Florida, offers unique specialized experience in discrete core collection and geologic formation identification.

Recommendation:

Staff recommends the Governing Board approve the bids submitted in response to Invitation to Bid 17B-009, and authorize the Executive Director to enter into an agreement for this timber sale with the high bidder, Panhandle Forestry Services, Inc. the bid prices of \$14.00 per ton for Pine Pulpwood; \$23.50 per ton for Pine Chip-N-Saw; \$30.50 per ton for Pine Saw Timber; and \$8.00 per ton for Hardwood Pulpwood.

Background:

On January 25, 2017, the District posted Invitation to Bid No. 17B-009 for the Altha North 2017 Thinning Timber Sale on the State's Vendor Bid System and the District's website. Notices were also sent to a number of companies that have previously expressed an interest in District timber sales.

This timber sale will result in the harvest of an estimated 16,896 tons of pine and hardwood timber products from 438 acres in Calhoun County, as described below. These stands are also delineated on the attached Exhibit Map A.

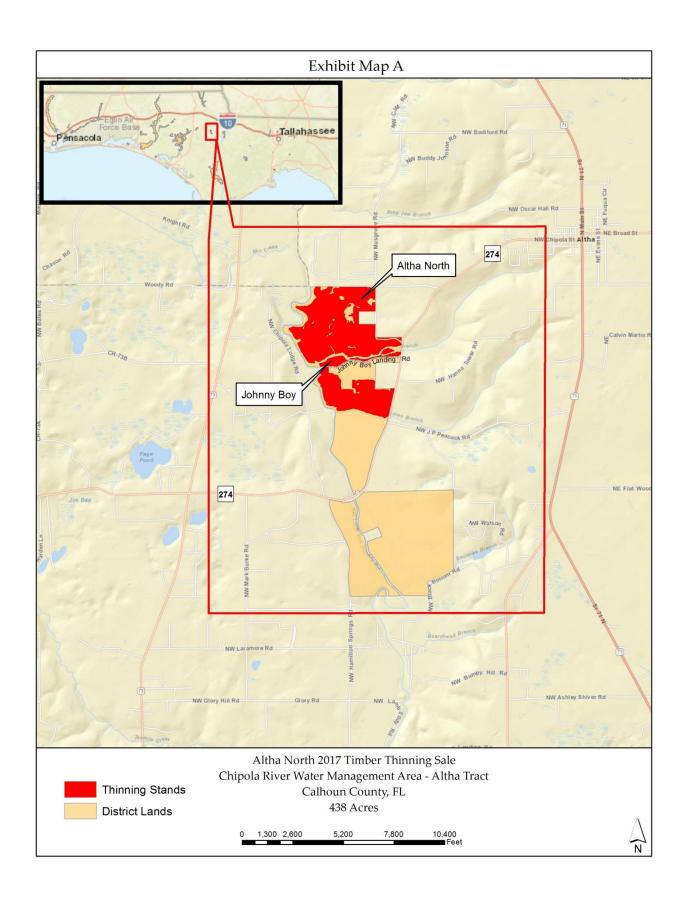

Easement at Meginnis Arm Stormwater Facility

Recommendation:

Staff is requesting the Governing Board to: (1) make a determination that the utility and temporary construction easement areas will not interfere with current or planned District purposes and (2) authorize the Executive Director to negotiate and authorize utility and temporary construction easements with the City of Tallahassee upon receipt of the final drawings and subject to legal counsel review.

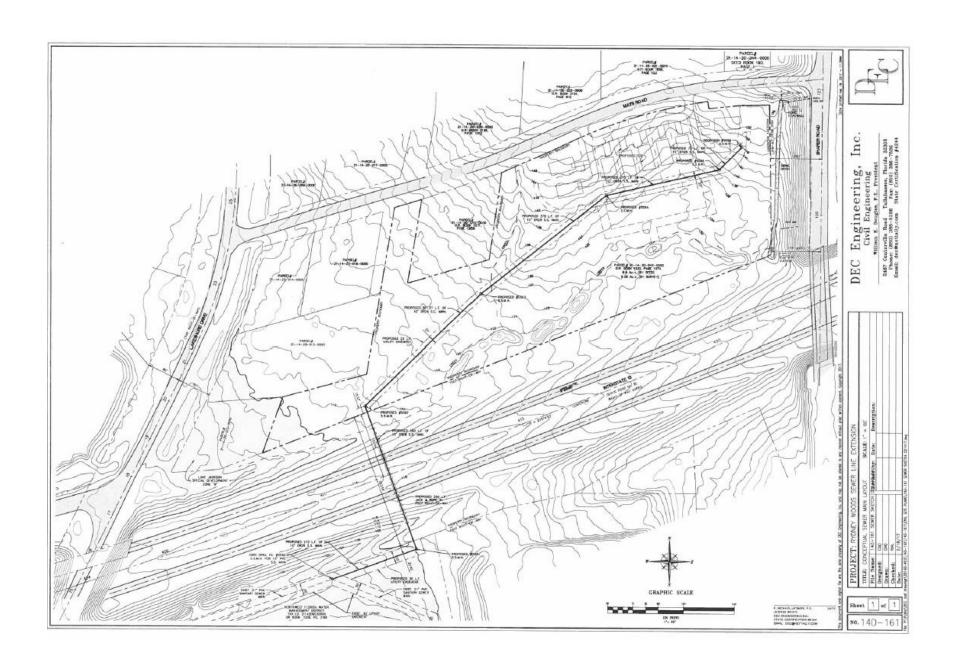
Background:

In 2009, the District granted the City of Tallahassee a perpetual easement for water and sewer lines that cross the District's Meginnis Arm Stornwater Facility in Leon County on the north and east sides (see attached map). The Meginnis Arm Facility is located east of Lakeshore Road and south of I-10 in Tallahassee.

DEC Engineering, representing Jenkins Roofing, Inc., has requested a utility easement to provide sewer to the Jenkins Roofing property located at 3062 Sharer Rd, Tallahassee, Florida (Parcel ID 2114200420000). The proposed connection route would pass under I-10 and tie into the existing sewer line located on the District's Meginnis Arm Stornwater Facility. A temporary construction easement will also be required to complete the sewer connection. The conceptual plan (see attached) provided by DEC Engineering indicates the off-site property to be served will be developed into nine home sites. The final utility easement will be conveyed to the City of Tallahassee.

Pursuant to 373.056(4) F.S., the District has the authority to convey to any governmental entity land or rights in land owned by the District not required for its purposes, under such terms and conditions as the Governing Board of the District may determine.

CGUPS, LLC, Steven Cox, and Claudia Cox, Petitioners v. Northwest Florida Water Management District and Florida Department of Transportation, Respondents, DOAH Case No. 16-4691

This is a case brought by the Petitioners challenging the proposed issuance by the District of an environmental resource permit to FDOT relating to FDOT's widening of State Road 390 in Panama City, Florida.

The discovery phase of the litigation is ongoing.

The final hearing of this case has been continued indefinitely and the case is currently held in abeyance under the jurisdiction of DOAH while FDOT considers modifying its permit application. As of March 1, 2017, FDOT has requested another 60 days from DOAH in order to work on permit application modifications.

The District is continuing to vigorously defend its decision to issue the permit and the District remains confident in its position.

There are no other pending cases in which the District is a party.
