Adjusting Beginning Fund Balance

Recommendation

Staff recommends the Governing Board approve Amendment No. 9 to the Fiscal Year 2016-2017 Budget adjusting fund balances.

Background

Amendment No. 9 adjusts the beginning budgeted fund balances based on the audited financial statements at September 30, 2016. This amendment does not increase or decrease the total operating expenditure budget for Fiscal Year (FY) 2016-2017.

Each year, after completion and approval of the prior year's audited financial statements, the audited balances are brought forward into the current year's budget in the form of an amendment. Funds impacted by the adjusted balances include the General Fund, the Capital Improvement and Lands Acquisition Fund, the Lands Management Fund, the Regulation Fund, and the Mitigation Fund.

In addition to the fund balance, the audited financial statements provide the unearned revenue available for the next year's budget. The amounts not currently budgeted in FY 2016-2017 are available for current and future year budgets.


Pine Timber Sale

Recommendation

Staff recommends the Governing Board approve continued participation in the Integrated Water Resources Monitoring (IWRM) program and authorize the Executive Director to execute a revenue contract with the Florida Department of Environmental Protection for that purpose. The District will be compensated up to \$139,380 on a fee schedule/cost reimbursement basis. The contract renewal period is July 1, 2017, through June 30, 2018.

Background

The Florida Department of Environmental Protection (DEP) created the IWRM program in the 1980s to systematically monitor surface water and groundwater quality. The District has participated in the program since its inception. The large volume of water quality data produced has supported timely, accurate assessment of the quality of the District's water resources. This data is available to the public through DEP's water quality database website, http://prodenv.dep.state.fl.us/DearSpa/public/welcome

This contract consists of two projects for the collection of surface water and groundwater quality data from sites across the District. Specifically:

- The Water Quality Status Project consists of the annual collection of 100 random samples, within the District, from six resource types: confined and unconfined aquifers, streams, rivers, large and small lakes.
- The Groundwater Quality Temporal Variability Project involves monthly sampling of nine wells at six fixed monitoring locations and is designed to track water quality changes over time.

DESCRIPTION:

North American Farms (NAF) requests modification of Individual Water Use Permit (IWUP) No. 2B-063-5754-5 for the construction of three additional agricultural wells, the addition of approximately 157 irrigated acres, and continued authorization of groundwater withdrawals from the Floridan aquifer for agricultural uses with no changes to the currently permitted withdrawal amounts.

The three proposed Floridan aquifer wells will be used to irrigate approximately 157 acres, in addition to the spring and fall plantings of various crops listed in the table below (out of a total owned acreage of approximately 2,800 acres). Staff previously utilized the Agricultural Field Scale Irrigation Requirements Simulation (AFSIRS) to estimate the irrigation demand associated with spring and fall plantings described in table above. In order to accurately model irrigation demands, input parameters for AFSIRS include daily estimates of evapotranspiration, precipitation, crop type, and soil types.

The applicant has requested the continued authorization of the currently permitted amounts and estimates that the previously AFSIRS-derived withdrawal amounts are adequate to meet NAF's irrigation demands. Given the applicant's historical pumping record and crop rotation, District staff concur and recommend authorization of the currently permitted AFSIRS-derived average daily and maximum monthly withdrawal amounts.

Staff used the analytical model DRAWDOWN to analyze potential impacts to the Floridan aquifer associated with the long-term withdrawal at the recommended average daily rate. The simulated drawdowns in the Floridan aquifer were 16 feet and 15 feet at distances of one-half mile and one mile, respectively, from the center of pumping.

The applicant's withdrawals represent an existing, long-term use of the Floridan aquifer, and the simulated drawdowns are not anticipated to cause harm to the resource or interfere with existing legal uses. However, to ensure the conditions of permit issuance will be met for the remainder of the recommended permit duration, the Permittee will be required to closely monitor and report hydrologic conditions in the Floridan aquifer.

PERMIT APPLICATION REVIEW:

Section 373.223, Florida Statutes (F.S.), and section 40A-2.301, Florida Administrative Code (F.A.C.), require an applicant to establish that the proposed use of water:

- (a) Is a reasonable-beneficial use;
- (b) Will not interfere with any presently existing legal use of water; and,
- (c) Is consistent with the public interest.

In addition, the above requirements are detailed further in the District's Water Use Permit Applicant's Handbook. District staff have reviewed the water use permit application pursuant to the above-described requirements and have determined that the application meets the conditions for issuance of this permit.

RECOMMENDATION:

It is the determination of the staff that the water use amounts recommended, as conditioned, are reasonable-beneficial, consistent with the public's interest, and will not harm the water resources of the area or interfere with existing legal uses. This determination has been made according to provisions of Chapter 373, F.S., and Chapter 40A-2, F.A.C.

Staff recommends that the applicant be granted an Individual Water Use Permit for an annual average daily withdrawal of 3.540 million gallons, and a maximum monthly withdrawal of 251.2 million gallons. Staff also recommends that the expiration date of the permit remain January 1, 2035, and that the permit be conditioned as per the "Conditions for Issuance" included in Exhibit A of the permit document.

"EXHIBIT A" CONDITIONS FOR ISSUANCE OF PERMIT NUMBER 2B-063-5754-5 North American Farms, LLC.

Specific Conditions

- 1. This permit shall expire on January 1, 2035.
- 2. This Permit authorizes the Permittee to make a combined average annual withdrawal of 3.540 million gallons per day (251.2 million gallons per month maximum) of groundwater from the Floridan aquifer for agricultural use. The individual facilities authorized to make this combined withdrawal are shown in the table below in the following condition. The total combined amounts of water withdrawn by all facilities listed shall not exceed the amounts identified above.

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- 4. The Permittee shall include the Individual Water Use Permit number and the well's Florida Unique Identification Number (e.g. AAA8875 for NAF #1) when submitting reports or otherwise corresponding with the District.
- 5. The Permittee, by January 31 of each year, shall submit a water use report for the previous calendar year (January December), even if no water is used. The Permittee shall record the data required on Water Use/Pumpage Report Form (Form 166). The Permittee, if preferred, may submit the report electronically by downloading the correct form from the District website, filling it out properly, and e-mailing it to compliance@nwfwater.com.
- 6. The Permittee shall install and maintain in-line, totalizing flow meters on all production wells. The meters shall be maintained to be at least 95% accurate and any meter determined defective must be replaced within 30 days of its discovery. The Permittee, within 30 days of well completion or completion of project construction, shall provide documentation to the District that the required flow meters have been installed and report the initial meter readings.
- 7. The Permittee, by October 31, in years 2019, 2024, 2029, and at the time of requesting a permit modification or renewal, shall submit documentation of the flow meter calibration and accuracy rating to the District using the Flow Meter Accuracy Report Form (Form 170). The Permittee, if preferred, may submit the report electronically by downloading the correct form from the District website, filling it out properly, and e-mailing it to compliance@nwfwater.com.
- 8. The Permittee, by January 31 of each year, shall submit a status report using Form 168, Annual Crop Summary Report Form. The report shall include: Type and acreage of crop(s) planted and irrigated; Type(s) of irrigation system(s); and the number of livestock being watered.
- 9. The Permittee, by October 31, 2019, 2024, and 2029 shall provide a description of water conservation and efficiency measures currently implemented or planned to be implemented during the permit duration to minimize groundwater and surface water withdrawals. Measures may include, but are not limited to: Irrigation system evaluation using the Mobile Irrigation Lab (MIL); Irrigation systems upgrades to improve efficiency; improvements to the operation and management of irrigation systems; enhancing reuse and recycling; limiting irrigation to early morning or evening hours to minimize evaporative losses; and other Best Management Practices.
- 10. The Permittee shall submit to the District in a single electronic submittal the following information by January 31, April 30, July 31 and October 31 of each year:

Static water level measurements conducted during the first two weeks of the above months for Floridan production wells NAF #2 (AAA8887), NAF #7 (AAA8881), NAF #9 (AAA8873), NAF #16 (AAD9037) and NAF #17 (AAF8395) using a District-approved water level measuring device. Water levels shall be taken following a 24-hour non-pumping period, as much as is practicable, reported as depth-to-water below a predefined measuring point. All measurements shall be taken from the same measuring point. If the measuring point is different from land surface elevation, then the Permittee shall provide the measuring point distance above or below land surface. All static water level reports shall include the date and time the well was turned off, date and time the measurement was taken, method and device used, and the water level measurement to

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- 0.01 foot for steel/electric tape and 1.0 foot precision for airline methods, respectively. The Permittee, if utilizing the airline method, shall also report airline length, gauge reading, linear distance of the airline terminus from land surface, and a description of where the airline terminates (e.g. land surface, pump base, pressure gauge, etc.).
- 11. The Permittee shall annually evaluate the efficiency of each of its irrigation units and undertake necessary maintenance, repairs and upgrades to provide for the proper efficiency of its equipment. The Permittee shall maintain the irrigation system to prevent wasteful runoff from the property associated with irrigation.
- 12. The Permittee shall equip the well and irrigation system with an anti-siphoning device if chemicals are to be applied through the irrigation system, as required by section 487.064. F.S.
- 13. The Permittee, prior to the construction, alteration and/or enhancement of any surface water withdrawal, diversion, or management system, shall contact the District to determine if a permit will be required. A permit would be required by the District for activities including creek sandbagging, sump excavation, and any maintenance beyond that considered routine or custodial.
- 14. The Permittee shall ensure that any new irrigation system(s) purchased is/are of an efficiency rating of 90% or greater.
- 15. The Permittee shall maximize the use of reclaimed water if it is available and its use is environmentally, economically and technically feasible.

Standard Conditions

- 16. All water uses authorized by this permit shall be implemented as conditioned by this permit, including any documents incorporated by reference in a permit condition. The District may revoke this permit, in whole or in part, or take enforcement action, pursuant to sections 373.136 or 373.243, F.S., unless a permit modification has been obtained to address the noncompliance.
- 17. The Permittee shall immediately notify the District in writing of any previously submitted information that is later discovered to be inaccurate.
- 18. This permit does not convey to the Permittee any property rights or privileges other than those specified herein, nor relieve the Permittee from complying with any applicable local government, state, or federal law, rule, or ordinance.
- 19. The Permittee shall notify the District in writing within 30 days of any sale, transfer, or conveyance of ownership or any other loss of permitted legal control of the Project and/or related facilities from which the permitted water use is made. Where Permittee's control of the land subject to the permit was demonstrated through a lease, the Permittee must either submit documentation showing that it continues to have legal control or transfer control of the permitted system/project to the new landowner or new lessee. All transfers of ownership are subject to the requirements of section 40A-2.351, F.A.C. Alternatively, the Permittee may surrender the water use permit to the District, thereby relinquishing the right to conduct any activities under the permit.

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- 20. Nothing in this permit should be construed to limit the authority of the District to declare a water shortage and issue orders pursuant to Chapter 373, F.S. In the event of a declared water shortage, the Permittee must adhere to the water shortage restrictions, as specified by the District. The Permittee is advised that during a water shortage, reports shall be submitted as required by District rule or order.
- 21. With advance notice to the Permittee, District staff with proper identification shall have permission to enter, inspect, observe, collect samples, and take measurements of permitted facilities to determine compliance with the permit conditions and permitted plans and specifications. The Permittee shall either accompany District staff onto the property or make provision for access onto the property.
- 22. The Permittee may seek modification of any term of an unexpired permit. The Permittee is advised that section 373.239, F.S., and section 40A-2.331, F.A.C., are applicable to permit modifications.
- 23. The Permittee shall mitigate any harm caused by withdrawals or diversions permitted herein on legal water uses, offsite land use, and water resources and associated environmental features which existed at the time of permit application. The District reserves the right to curtail permitted withdrawal and diversion rates if the withdrawal or diversion causes harm to legal uses of water, offsite land use, or water resources and associated environmental features that existed at the time of permit application.
- 24. The Permittee shall not cause harmful saltwater intrusion. The District reserves the right to curtail permitted withdrawal rates if withdrawals cause harmful saline water intrusion.
- 25. The Permittee's consumptive use of water as authorized by this permit shall not reduce a flow or level below any minimum flow or level established by the District or the Department of Environmental Protection pursuant to Sections 373.042 and 373.0421, F.S. If the Permittee's use of water causes or contributes to such a reduction, then the District shall revoke the permit, in whole or in part, unless the Permittee implements all provisions applicable to the Permittee's use in a District-approved recovery or prevention strategy.
- 26. The Permittee shall mitigate any harm caused by withdrawals or diversions permitted herein on legal uses, offsite land use, and water resources and associated environmental features which existed at the time of permit application. Mitigation may include modification of the Permittee's pumping schedule (i.e., duration, withdrawal rates, time of day, etc.), the lowering of the affected pump(s) or the replacement of the well(s) including proper plugging and abandonment of the well(s) that is replaced. The Permittee, upon receipt of an allegation of interference, shall retain the services of an appropriate licensed professional to investigate the alleged interference. The Permittee shall ensure their chosen professional investigates any alleged interference within 48 hours of the allegation being made and provides the conclusions of the investigation to the entity alleging the impact within 72 hours of the allegation being made. If it is determined that the use of a well has been impaired as a result of the Permittee's operation, the Permittee shall complete the required mitigation within 30 days. The Permittee shall be responsible for the payment of services rendered by the licensed professional. The Permittee, within 30 days of any allegation of interference, shall submit a report to the District including the date of the allegation, the name and contact information of the party making the allegation, the result of the investigation made, and any mitigation action undertaken.

SUBJECT: Consideration of Admendment No. 1 to Nokuse Conservation

Easement; Choctawhatchee River WMA

Recommendation

Staff recommends approval of Amendment No. 1 to the Nokuse Conservation Easement (CE) in Walton County, subject to legal counsel review and approval.

Summary:

Nokuse Plantation is seeking to amend its existing District CE encumbering the property to allow gopher tortoise relocation activities.

The requested amendment to the CE will not negatively impact the water resources on the site or the area nor reduce the conservation values obtained by the purchase of the original conservation easement.

Background

On March 17, 2011, the District purchased a CE on 1,095.30 acres of property owned by Nokuse Plantation to protect the natural resources. This property is located northeast of Freeport and north of Highway 20 in Walton County and borders the District's Lafayette Creek tract on the north boundary (see attached map). When the CE was acquired, the property consisted of former agricultural land interspersed with seepage streams associated with the watersheds of Magnolia and Lafayette Creeks. Since then, Nokuse Plantation has been actively restoring the property's uplands back to longleaf pine habitat.

The Florida Fish and Wildlfie Conservation Commission (FWC) has issued Nokuse a permit to relocate up to 1,000 tortoises on to 250-acres of the property that is encumbered by the District's CE. Thus far, 175 tortoises have been relocated. However, the District's CE does not accomadate this activity. Nokuse is requesting the District's CE be amended to allow the relocation of up to 1,000 tortoises on to this specific 250 acres (see attached map) to be used as a *long-term protected site*.

Nokuse charges an average fee of \$800 per tortoise to relocate a tortoise to the protected site; however, they are required by FWC to set aside \$300 per tortoise for a management trust fund. In addition, to setting aside \$300 per tortoise, Nokuse has the following expenses for initial set up and annual maintenance costs:


Nokuse is also requesting the District's CE be amended to allow the relocation of up to an additional 900 tortoises on a separate 300 acres that will be used as an *incidental take* permit site. Under the "Incidental Take" scenario, Nokuse is allowing the placement of these tortoises on to their property at no charge to keep the tortoises from being extinguished; however, Nokuse will incur expenses for silt fence, electric fence, prescribed burning and daily monitoring and a cost of \$200 per tortoise to relocate each one on to their property.

Chris Candler (appraiser) of Candler Moses & Associates was tasked with preparing a valuation determination of the impact on value resulting from the proposed amendment to the existing conservation easement with Nokuse Plantation. Since the rights in question, i.e., gopher tortoise relocation, are not typically traded on the open market, and because no change in overall use of the property is expected, the impact of the amendment cannot be measured by direct sales comparison. Instead, he analyzed the cash flow created by the proposed amendment in an attempt to quantify any increased return. Through consideration of the income and expenses expected by the gopher tortoise relocation in a discounted cash flow analysis, it was determined that a net loss in property value to the property owner's interest could be expected. As such, it was the appraiser's opinion that no compensation is due the water management district for the amendment requested.

Nokuse Plantation has expressed a willingness to pay all expenses associated with the preparation and recording of this amendment; however, the District is not requesting reimbursement of staff time associated with this amendment. Expenses to accomplish this amendment total approximately \$1,250 and include the following:

CGUPS, LLC, Steven Cox, and Claudia Cox, Petitioners v. Northwest Florida Water Management District and Florida Department of Transportation, Respondents, DOAH Case No. 16-4691

This is a case brought by the Petitioners challenging the proposed issuance by the District of an environmental resource permit to FDOT relating to FDOT's widening of State Road 390 in Panama City, Florida.

The discovery phase of the litigation is ongoing.

The final hearing of this case has been continued indefinitely and the case is currently held in abeyance under the jurisdiction of DOAH while FDOT considers modifying its permit application. On May 1, 2017, DOAH issued an order holding the case in abeyance and requiring notification no later than June 29, 2017, of the status of this matter and as to the length of time required for the final hearing and several mutually-agreeable dates for scheduling the final hearing should one be necessary.

The District is continuing to vigorously defend its decision to issue the permit and the District remains confident in its position.

Robert C. Yon v. Harold Pickron, et al, Fourteenth Judicial Circuit Court Case No. 11000088CAXMX

This is a case brought *pro se* by Robert C. Yon against various officials in Calhoun County, including the Board of County Commissioners and the Sheriff. The District is named as a party but it is unclear from the complaint what, if any, claims the plaintiff makes against the District. It does not appear that the District has ever been properly served in this case. On April 12, 2017, the Court *sua sponte* issued a Notice of Lack of Prosecution on the basis that no activity had

occurred in the case during the past 10 months and set the Notice for hearing June 19, 2017, at 1:00 PM, CST, in Calhoun County Circuit Court.

There are no other pending cases in which the District is a party.
