Purchases

Recommendation

Staff recommends the Governing Board authorize the District to have the option to purchase commodities and contractual services from purchasing agreements of another entity using their solicitation and contract terms, if the other entity is a governmental unit or entity acting on behalf of governmental units, and to incorporate into the District's internal policies and procedures manual.

Background

Florida Statutes authorize the Governing Board to contract with public agencies, private corporations, or other persons¹. To the extent consistent with effective management practices, the District is to approximate its procedures to those of the State of Florida². Most of the state's procurement procedures are based on Ch. 287, F.S., "Procurement of Personal Property and Services."

Per s. 287.042(16), F.S., the state's Department of Management Services (Department) is authorized to evaluate contracts let by the Federal Government, another state, or a political subdivision for the provision of commodities and contract services and, if determined to be in the best interest of the state, to enter into a written agreement authorizing a state agency to make purchases under such contract. Department procedures provide access to a list of Department-approved alternative contract sources (ACS) and allow a state agency to find and purchase from other ACSs, as long as the state agency requests and obtains approval from the Department prior to such purchases.³ A Department-approved ACS example is the General Service Administration

Schedule 70 Cooperative Purchasing Program that sells information technology equipment, software and services.

Chapter 6 of the District's internal policies and procedures manual allows the District to procure from the Department's competitively bid state term contracts and alternative contract sources.⁴ The District may also purchase or "piggyback" from competitively procured purchasing agreements of other special districts, municipalities, or counties that meet the District's procurement requirements as well as from federal, state, or political subdivision competitively procured contracts that contain a clause allowing their use by other entities.⁵

While the District has these procurement options, the District does not have a policy to purchase from alternative contract sources not on the Department of Management Services approved ACS list. Furthermore, the Department's Division of State Purchasing has informed us they only have authority to approve ACS requests from state agencies and are therefore precluded from reviewing an ACS request from a water management district. The type of ACS agreements the District is unable to benefit from, in particular, include, but are not limited to, state of Florida governmental entities, General Services Administration, and governmental purchasing cooperative (e.g., US Communities, Western States Contracting Alliance, Florida Sheriffs Association, National Purchasing Partners) contracts and purchases.

SUBJECT: Consideration of Tracked Skid Loader and Implements Purchase

Recommendation

Staff recommends the Governing Board approve the purchase of a John Deere 333G compact track loader and implements through an approved government purchasing program in an amount not to exceed \$145,000.

Background

The District's land management and wetland mitigation restoration responsibilities often require the removal or clearing of large amounts of shrubby vegetation and small trees. One of the most economical methods for vegetation management of this nature is to utilize a rotary-drum mulching head on a small tracked machine. The District often contracts for this type of work, but in recent years we have had difficulty mobilizing contractors at times that are optimal (dry conditions) for the targeted sites. In addition to the mulching work described above, the District also needs the ability to perform heavy mowing and brushing back of roads, firelines, ditches, dams, trails and other similar areas. The District's current fleet of vegetation management equipment includes farm tractors with bush-hog type mowers, a Browns Tree Cutter, and a small rear-mounted mulcher attachment. These machines cannot perform the heavy mowing and other tasks that can be easily accomplished with a properly outfitted compact track loader.

Land Management Operations staff have researched the various types of equipment suitable for this type of work and have determined the John Deere 333G compact track loader with three different implements would best suit our needs. The mulching attachment is the most demanding, so the options specified for the 333G are configured in a manner that facilitates use of this attachment. Requirements for the mulching attachment include a machine in the 100 horsepower range, high flow hydraulics, and various features built into the enclosed cab to protect the operator. The specified machine also includes a winch, warning lights, and rear

view camera to ensure efficient and safe operation. Because mulching operations generate large amounts of wood chips and sawdust, heat shielding will be added to components within the undercarriage and engine compartment to prevent combustion of accumulated debris.

Working through its local dealers (in this case, Beard Equipment in Pensacola), John Deere offers government purchasing through various programs, including State of Florida Term Contracts, the Florida Sheriffs Association Cooperative Purchasing Program, and National Purchasing Partners Cooperative Contract.

At this time, the State of Florida term contract does not list the John Deere 333G as an available model, so it is necessary to utilize an alternative purchasing program. Beard Equipment has provided two quotes for the specified machine and implements, which are summarized below:

Recommendation:

Staff recommends the Governing Board authorize the Executive Director to execute an agreement with the Florida Department of Agriculture and Consumer Services to provide Northwest Florida Mobile Irrigation Lab services within the District for FY 2017-18, FY 2018-19, and FY 2019-20 with a Maximum Total Compensation amount not to exceed \$213,375 or an estimated annual amount of \$71,125 each fiscal year, subject to approval and adoption of the budget for each fiscal year.

Background:

Since 1994, the District's Governing Board has approved support for the Northwest Florida Mobile Irrigation Lab (NWFMIL). The NWFMIL is an ongoing joint effort between the District, the Natural Resources Conservation Service (NRCS) and the Florida Department of Agriculture and Consumer Services (FDACS). The agencies are ready to begin the 14th year of providing irrigation efficiency evaluations and related services within the District. The NWFMIL is a free and voluntary service that helps the agricultural community increase irrigation efficiency, conserve water resources, prevent runoff, and reduce nutrient leaching while reducing operating costs. The NWFMIL provides assistance across all 16 counties in the District with priority given to systems within delineated spring recharge basins in Jackson County and within the Water Resource Caution Area in Gadsden County. The NWFMIL is also providing support for the District's agricultural best management practices cost-share program. Since the NWFMIL's inception in northwest Florida, team members have completed 963 evaluations, covering an irrigated area of over 69,000 acres. The average total water savings estimated by NWFMIL personnel equal approximately 10.8 million gallons of water per day.

The NWFMIL services are provided through the Jackson Soil and Water Conservation District and are funded through the District (\$71,125), FDACS (approximately \$82,500), and the NRCS (approximately \$61,500), who provides in-kind budget expenses including office space, a vehicle, equipment, and supplies. The total annual cost for the NWFMIL services is approximately \$215,000. The District will continue to receive quarterly reports summarizing all evaluations performed along with actual and potential water savings.

- (b) The Department agrees to administer a contract such that the NWFMIL assists agricultural irrigators, at no cost to the service recipient, by evaluating individual irrigation systems and providing recommendations for improvement for the purpose of water conservation.
- (c) The Department agrees to administer a contract that will provide technically trained personnel and any equipment necessary for the NWFMIL to carry out its annual work plan within the guidelines of the most current NRCS/Department Mobile Irrigation Lab Handbook.
- (d) The Department agrees to administer a contract that, annually, requires the NWFMIL to perform at least 100 irrigation system evaluations. The District will coordinate with the NWFMIL staff to submit an electronic copy of each individual irrigation system evaluation report to the District on a quarterly basis.
- (e) The Department agrees to administer a contract that requires that the NWFMIL update the statewide MIL database being maintained by the Department on a quarterly basis.
- (f) The Department agrees to provide the District project manager with ongoing access to the statewide MIL database that the Department maintains.
- (g) The Department agrees to use funds obtained from the District pursuant to this Agreement solely for the purposes of the NWFMIL operation, as described in herein.

2. Period of Agreement

This Agreement shall begin on October 1, 2017 and end on September 30, 2020. The Department shall be eligible for reimbursement for work performed on or after October 1, 2017 through the expiration date of this Agreement. No costs incurred prior to October 1, 2017 are eligible for reimbursement.

3. Funding/Invoicing

The District agrees to provide funding not to exceed seventy-one thousand one hundred twenty-five dollars and 00/100 (\$71,125.00) annually in support of the NWFMIL from October 1 through September 30; in quarterly, lump-sum amounts of \$17,781.25. The total amount authorized by this Agreement, subject to annual budget appropriations by the District's Governing Board for such purposes, shall not exceed \$213,375.00. It is understood that any additional funds necessary for the operation of the NWFMIL are the responsibility of the Department, in cooperation with other project partners.

The Department shall submit a written invoice request for payment and supporting documentation containing, at a minimum, contact information, the Agreement title and number, an invoice number, invoice date, invoicing time period, and authorized signature.

The final invoice must be received by the District Project Manager no later than twenty-one (21) days following the end of the District fiscal year (October 1 – September 30).

The District agrees to provide payment for work satisfactorily completed, within thirty (30) days of the District's receipt and acceptance of an invoice, provided that: a) the invoice contains sufficient detail for a proper pre-audit and post-audit thereof; and b) the Department has performed the work according to the terms and conditions of this Agreement. Failure by the Department to follow these instructions shall result in an unavoidable delay of payment by the District.

4. **Quarterly Reports**

The Department shall ensure that the NWFMIL submits an electronic copy of each individual irrigation system evaluation report to the District on a quarterly basis (see schedule below).

5. Indemnification

The District shall have no liability or responsibility to the Department, its contractors, any governmental entity, or the employees, agents, representatives, licensees, invitees, and guests of the Department and its contractors or any other person or entity associated with the project, and the Department shall and hereby agrees to release, indemnify and hold harmless the District against any and all injury, loss, liability, claim, damage and expense whatsoever

(including all expenses reasonably incurred in investigating, preparing or defending against any claim whatsoever) including reasonable attorney's fees and expenses, arising out of, based upon or resulting from the Department's use of District funds, whether caused by the negligence of any agent, representative, employee, contractor, invitee, permittee, customer or client of the Department, the negligence of another or any other third party, or the negligence of the District.

6. <u>Default/Termination</u>

If either party fails to fulfill its obligations under this Agreement in a timely and proper manner, the other party shall have the right to terminate this Agreement by giving written notice of any deficiency and by allowing the party in default thirty (30) calendar days from receipt of notice to correct the deficiency. If the defaulting party fails to correct the deficiency within this time, this Agreement shall terminate at the expiration of the 30-day time period unless an extension of time is approved in writing by both parties.

Either party may terminate this Agreement for convenience by providing the other party with thirty (30) days written notice.

7. Remedies/Financial Consequences

No payment will be made for tasks or deliverables deemed unsatisfactory by the District. If the NWFMIL fails to conduct at least 100 evaluations annually, the final payment will be reduced \$100 for each evaluation not performed.

8. Compliance with Law

The Department agrees to comply with all applicable federal, state and local rules and regulations in providing services under this Agreement and acknowledges that this requirement includes, but is not limited to, compliance with all applicable federal, state and local health and safety rules and regulations. The Department further agrees to include this provision in all subcontracts issued as a result of this Agreement.

9. Notice

All notices and written communication between the parties shall be sent by electronic mail, U.S. Mail, a courier delivery service, or delivered in person. Notices shall be considered delivered when reflected by an electronic mail read receipt, a courier service delivery receipt, other mail service delivery receipt, or when receipt is acknowledged by recipient.

DESCRIPTION:

City of Marianna requests modification of Individual Water Use Permit (IWUP) No. 2B-063-56-6 for the merger of IWUP No. 2B-063-056-6 and IWUP No. 2E-063-3656-7, continued authorization of groundwater withdrawals from the Floridan aquifer for public supply and commercial (bottled water) uses without changes to the combined currently permitted Average Daily Rate (ADR), and changes to the combined currently permitted Maximum Monthly Rate (MMR) due to the variability in seasonal demand derived from historical peaking ratios.

Water use demand associated with the Sunland Training Center has been assumed by the City of Marianna. The applicant has reported uniform residential per capita usage below the District goal of 110 gallons per capita daily (gpcd) for the combined use. However, the utility has also reported water losses in excess of the recommended ten percent goal. Therefore, the City of Marianna has begun implementing a goal based conservation plan and anticipates reduction of losses to meet the recommended ten percent goal by the expiration of the proposed permit. The permittee will continue to update the District on the progress of their conservation plan through the submittal of customer use data each year.

Drawdowns of approximately 5.3 feet and 5.1 feet were simulated at distances of one-half mile and one mile, respectively, from the center of pumping. These drawdowns are not anticipated to cause harm to the resource or interfere with existing legal uses.

PERMIT APPLICATION REVIEW:

Section 373.223, Florida Statutes (F.S.), and section 40A-2.301, Florida Administrative Code (F.A.C.), require an applicant to establish that the proposed use of water:

- (a) Is a reasonable-beneficial use;
- (b) Will not interfere with any presently existing legal use of water; and,
- (c) Is consistent with the public interest.

In addition, the above requirements are detailed further in the District's Water Use Permit Applicant's Handbook. District staff have reviewed the water use permit application pursuant to the above-described requirements and have determined that the application meets the conditions for issuance of this permit. Highlights of the staff review are provided below.

RECOMMENDATION:

It is the determination of the staff that the water use amounts recommended, as conditioned, are reasonable-beneficial, consistent with the public's interest, and will not harm the water resources of the area or interfere with existing legal uses. This determination has been made according to provisions of Chapter 373, F.S., and Chapter 40A-2, F.A.C.

Staff recommends that the applicant be granted an Individual Water Use Permit for an annual average daily withdrawal of 2.26 million gallons and a maximum monthly withdrawal of 98.31 million gallons. Staff also recommends that the expiration date of the permit remain April 1, 2034, and that the permit be conditioned as per the "Conditions for Issuance" included in Exhibit A of the permit document.

- 1. This permit shall expire on April 1, 2034.
- 2. This Permit authorizes the Permittee to make a combined average annual withdrawal of 2.26 million gallons per day (98.31 million gallons per month maximum) of groundwater from the Floridan aquifer for public supply use. The individual facilities authorized to make this combined withdrawal are shown in the table below. The total combined amounts of water withdrawn by all facilities listed shall not exceed the amounts identified above.

- 4. The Permittee shall include the Individual Water Use Permit number and the well's Florida Unique Identification Number (e.g. AAA8682 for CM #1) when submitting reports or otherwise corresponding with the District.
- 5. The Permittee, by January 31 of each year, shall submit a water use report for the previous calendar year (January December), even if no water is used. The Permittee shall record the data required on Water Use Summary Reporting Form (Form 172). The Permittee, if preferred, may submit the report electronically by downloading the correct form from the District website, filling it out properly, and e-mailing it to compliance@nwfwater.com. The next report is due by January 31, 2018.
- 6. The Permittee shall install and maintain in-line, totalizing flow meters on all production wells. The meters shall be maintained to be at least 95% accurate and any meter determined defective must be replaced within 30 days of its discovery. The Permittee, within 30 days of well completion or completion of project construction, shall provide documentation to the District that the required flow meters have been installed and report the initial meter readings.
- 7. The Permittee, by October 31, in years 2022, 2027, 2032, and at the time of requesting a permit modification or renewal, shall submit documentation of the flow meter calibration and accuracy rating to the District using the Flow Meter Accuracy Report Form (Form 170). The Permittee, if preferred, may submit the report electronically by downloading the correct form from the District website, filling it out properly, and e-mailing it to compliance@nwfwater.com.

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- 8. The Permittee, by December 31, in years 2022, 2027, 2032, and at the time of permit renewal or modification shall provide a map showing areas where service is actually provided as well as the overall franchise area allocated to the utility by the county, Public Service Commission or other authorizing entity. Definable areas within a service area that are served by domestic potable wells shall be delineated as non-served unless the area will be supplied by the utility within the term of the permit. The Permittee shall submit the map in digital format compatible with ESRI ArcGIS software, if available.
- 9. The Permittee shall ensure its Water Conservation and Efficiency Program achieves the goals listed below. The Permittee, by March 31 of each year and at the time of permit modification or renewal, shall report to the District its performance regarding each element of the Water Conservation and Efficiency Program during the previous calendar year.
 - a. Achieve and maintain total and real water losses less than or equal to 10 percent of the distribution system, unless the Permittee demonstrates using American Water Works Association (AWWA) methods that a higher loss rate is appropriate for the distribution system. The Permittee shall report water losses each year, compare estimated water losses to the goal(s), and briefly describe ongoing or planned water loss reduction measures.
 - b. Maintain average residential per capita daily water use of 110 gallons or less. The residential per capita water use shall be calculated as the amount of water used by residential dwelling units divided by the residential population served. The residential population served can be estimated as the number of residential dwelling units served multiplied by the average persons per household derived from US Census data. Adjustments to account for seasonal or tourist populations can be made, if adequately documented. The Permittee shall report a summary description of status regarding the per capita use goal.
 - c. Initiation or continued implementation and enhancement of a public education and information campaign to promote water conservation and efficiency. The campaign shall consist of activities such as informative billing, periodic mail outs to customers, website announcements, newspaper notices, etc. Public education and information efforts shall be implemented at least annually. The Permittee shall provide a description of the public education and information campaign. The Permittee shall utilize a strategy designed to regularly reach year-round and part-time residents and tourists. The campaign shall consist of newspaper notices and articles, periodic radio and television announcements, periodic mail-outs to customers and the posting of signs and informational brochures in the rooms of hotels, motels and rental property. The campaign shall be oriented to emphasize the program being implemented and water conservation in general, and on at least an annual basis, shall also specifically inform existing customers of ways to save water, ways to detect leaks, reduce demands, enhance efficiency, and detail the automatic irrigation shut-off requirement of Chapter 373.62, Florida Statutes. The Permittee shall provide a description of the public education and information campaign to the District by March 31st of each year.
 - d. The Permittee shall perform a rate structure evaluation with the intended purpose of creating or maintaining a structure to promote water use efficiency and discourage waste while providing for a life-line initial rate. Any refinements shall take into consideration the water use characteristics of the service area and provide financial incentives to customers to

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conserve and use water efficiently. The Permittee, by 2022, 2027, and 2032, shall submit to the District the results of the evaluation and a schedule for considering the adoption of such a rate structure and a copy of its present/current rate structure as well as analysis and projection of the amount of water projected to be conserved.

10. The Permittee, by March 31 of each year, shall report to the District the following information for the previous calendar year:

11. The Permittee, prior to January 31, 2024, shall evaluate and submit to the District the feasibility of providing reclaimed water within its service area to users that would provide for a direct reduction in groundwater withdrawals. The investigation shall be sufficiently detailed to document the findings of the determination. If determined technically, economically and environmentally feasible, the Permittee shall provide an implementation schedule for supplying the reclaimed water.

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12. The Permittee shall encourage and provide for the efficient and non-wasteful use of water, and shall implement water conservation measures, including a proactive leak detection program, designed to enhance water use efficiency and reduce water demand and water losses.

Standard Conditions

- 13. All water uses authorized by this permit shall be implemented as conditioned by this permit, including any documents incorporated by reference in a permit condition. The District may revoke this permit, in whole or in part, or take enforcement action, pursuant to sections 373.136 or 373.243, F.S., unless a permit modification has been obtained to address the noncompliance.
- 14. The Permittee shall immediately notify the District in writing of any previously submitted information that is later discovered to be inaccurate.
- 15. This permit does not convey to the Permittee any property rights or privileges other than those specified herein, nor relieve the Permittee from complying with any applicable local government, state, or federal law, rule, or ordinance.
- 16. The Permittee shall notify the District in writing within 30 days of any sale, transfer, or conveyance of ownership or any other loss of permitted legal control of the Project and/or related facilities from which the permitted water use is made. Where Permittee's control of the land subject to the permit was demonstrated through a lease, the Permittee must either submit documentation showing that it continues to have legal control or transfer control of the permitted system/project to the new landowner or new lessee. All transfers of ownership are subject to the requirements of section 40A-2.351, F.A.C. Alternatively, the Permittee may surrender the water use permit to the District, thereby relinquishing the right to conduct any activities under the permit.
- 17. Nothing in this permit should be construed to limit the authority of the District to declare a water shortage and issue orders pursuant to Chapter 373, F.S. In the event of a declared water shortage, the Permittee must adhere to the water shortage restrictions, as specified by the District. The Permittee is advised that during a water shortage, reports shall be submitted as required by District rule or order.
- 18. With advance notice to the Permittee, District staff with proper identification shall have permission to enter, inspect, observe, collect samples, and take measurements of permitted facilities to determine compliance with the permit conditions and permitted plans and specifications. The Permittee shall either accompany District staff onto the property or make provision for access onto the property.
- 19. The Permittee may seek modification of any term of an unexpired permit. The Permittee is advised that section 373.239, F.S., and section 40A-2.331, F.A.C., are applicable to permit modifications.

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- 20. The District reserves the right to curtail permitted withdrawal and diversion rates if the withdrawal or diversion causes harm to legal uses of water, offsite land use, or water resources and associated environmental features that existed at the time of permit application.
- 21. The Permittee shall not cause harmful saltwater intrusion. The District reserves the right to curtail permitted withdrawal rates if withdrawals cause harmful saline water intrusion.
- 22. The Permittee's consumptive use of water as authorized by this permit shall not reduce a flow or level below any minimum flow or level established by the District or the Department of Environmental Protection pursuant to Sections 373.042 and 373.0421, F.S. If the Permittee's use of water causes or contributes to such a reduction, then the District shall revoke the permit, in whole or in part, unless the Permittee implements all provisions applicable to the Permittee's use in a District-approved recovery or prevention strategy.
- 23. The Permittee shall mitigate any harm caused by withdrawals or diversions permitted herein on legal uses, offsite land use, and water resources and associated environmental features which existed at the time of permit application. Mitigation may include modification of the Permittee's pumping schedule (i.e., duration, withdrawal rates, time of day, etc.), the lowering of the affected pump(s) or the replacement of the well(s) including proper plugging and abandonment of the well(s) that is replaced. The Permittee, upon receipt of an allegation of interference, shall retain the services of an appropriate licensed professional to investigate the alleged interference. The Permittee shall ensure their chosen professional investigates any alleged interference within 48 hours of the allegation being made and provides the conclusions of the investigation to the entity alleging the impact within 72 hours of the allegation being made. If it is determined that the use of a well has been impaired as a result of the Permittee's operation, the Permittee shall complete the required mitigation within 30 days. The Permittee shall be responsible for the payment of services rendered by the licensed professional. The Permittee, within 30 days of any allegation of interference, shall submit a report to the District including the date of the allegation, the name and contact information of the party making the allegation, the result of the investigation made, and any mitigation action undertaken.

This Permit authorizes the Permittee to make a combined average annual withdrawal of 1.08 million gallons per day (39.9 million gallons per month maximum) of groundwater from the Floridan and Claiborne aquifers for public supply use.

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RECOMMENDED PERMIT DURATION AND COMPLIANCE REPORTING:

Staff recommends the permit expiration date be January 1, 2038. The Permittee is required to submit and comply with all information and data pursuant to the conditions set forth in the permit.

DESCRIPTION:

City of Bonifay (Bonifay) requests renewal of Individual Water Use Permit (IWUP) No. 2B-059-6164-5 for the continued authorization of groundwater withdrawals from the Floridan and Claiborne aquifer for public supply use without changes to the currently permitted withdrawal amounts.

Bonifay withdraws water from the Floridan aquifer and the Claiborne aquifer to provide potable service to the city's retail public supply base which serves a population within its service area of approximately 4,000 customers. Bonifay's service area population is expected to remain stable during the recommended permit duration of 20 years. Bonifay's residential per capita water use has averaged 53 gallons per day between 2012 and 2015, which meets the District's water use efficiency goal of 100 gallons per day or less. The requested and recommended withdrawal amounts allocated for Public Supply are considered reasonable and adequate to meet Bonifay's water use demands for the recommended permit duration.

Bonifay experienced self-reported water losses as high as 20.1 percent in 2013 which does not meet the District's water use efficiency goal of 10 percent or less. Following the reported losses in 2013, Bonifay initiated efforts to decrease water losses through replacing defective meters and improving water lines. These efforts resulted in a reduction of water losses to 11.5 percent in 2015.

Staff utilized the software program DRAWDOWN to simulate potential impacts associated with long-term withdrawal of the average daily rate both in Floridan aquifer wells and Claiborne aquifer wells. Simulated drawdowns of approximately 13 feet and 11 feet were simulated at distances of one-half mile and one mile, respectively, from the center of pumping in the Floridan aquifer. Simulated drawdowns of approximately 23 feet and 19.5 feet were simulated at distances at one-half mile and one mile, respectively, from the center of pumping in the Claiborne aquifer.

The proposed withdrawal amounts and associated drawdowns are not anticipated to cause harm to the resource or interfere existing legal use(s).

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PERMIT APPLICATION REVIEW:

Section 373.223, Florida Statutes (F.S.), and section 40A-2.301, Florida Administrative Code (F.A.C.), require an applicant to establish that the proposed use of water:

- (a) Is a reasonable-beneficial use;
- (b) Will not interfere with any presently existing legal use of water; and,
- (c) Is consistent with the public interest.

In addition, the above requirements are detailed further in the District's Water Use Permit Applicant's Handbook. District staff have reviewed the water use permit application pursuant to the above-described requirements and have determined that the application meets the conditions for issuance of this permit.

RECOMMENDATION:

It is the determination of the staff that the water use amounts recommended, as conditioned, are reasonable-beneficial, consistent with the public's interest, and will not harm the water resources of the area or interfere with existing legal use(s). This determination has been made according to provisions of Chapter 373, F.S., and Chapter 40A-2, F.A.C.

Staff recommends that the applicant be granted an Individual Water Use Permit for an annual average daily withdrawal of 1.08 million gallons; and a maximum monthly withdrawal of 39.9 million gallons. Staff also recommends that the expiration date of the permit be January 1, 2038, and that the permit be conditioned as per the "Conditions for Issuance" included in Exhibit A of the permit document.

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"EXHIBIT A" CONDITIONS FOR ISSUANCE OF PERMIT NUMBER 2B-059-6164-5 City of Bonifay

Specific Conditions

- 1. This permit shall expire on January 1, 2038.
- 2. This Permit authorizes the Permittee to make a combined average annual withdrawal of 1.08 million gallons per day (39.9 million gallons per month maximum) of groundwater from the Floridan and Claiborne aquifers for public supply use. The individual facilities authorized to make this combined withdrawal are shown in the table below. The total combined amounts of water withdrawn by all facilities listed shall not exceed the amounts identified above.

- 4. The Permittee shall include the Individual Water Use Permit number and the well's Florida Unique Identification Number (e.g. AAA0435 for CB-1) when submitting reports or otherwise corresponding with the District.
- 5. The Permittee, by January 31 of each year, shall submit a water use report for the previous calendar year (January December), even if no water is used. The Permittee shall record the data required on Water Use Summary Reporting Form (Form 172). The Permittee, if preferred, may submit the report electronically by downloading the correct form from the District website, filling it out properly, and e-mailing it to compliance@nwfwater.com. The next report is due by January 31, 2018.
- 6. The Permittee shall install and maintain in-line, totalizing flow meters on all production wells. The meters shall be maintained to be at least 95% accurate and any meter determined defective must be replaced within 30 days of its discovery. The Permittee, within 30 days of well completion or completion of project construction, shall provide documentation to the District that the required flow meters have been installed and report the initial meter readings.
- 7. The Permittee, by October 31, in years 2023, 2028, 2033, and at the time of requesting a permit modification or renewal, shall submit documentation of the flow meter calibration and accuracy rating to the District using the Flow Meter Accuracy Report Form (Form 170). The Permittee, if

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- preferred, may submit the report electronically by downloading the correct form from the District website, filling it out properly, and e-mailing it to compliance@nwfwater.com.
- 8. The Permittee, by December 31, in years 2023, 2028, 2033, and at the time of permit renewal or modification shall provide a map showing areas where service is actually provided as well as the overall franchise area allocated to the utility by the county, Public Service Commission or other authorizing entity. Definable areas within a service area that are served by domestic potable wells shall be delineated as non-served unless the area will be supplied by the utility within the term of the permit. The Permittee shall submit the map in digital format compatible with ESRI ArcGIS software, if available.
- 9. The Permittee shall ensure its Water Conservation and Efficiency Program achieves the goals listed below. The Permittee, by March 31 of each year and at the time of permit modification or renewal, shall report to the District its performance regarding each element of the Water Conservation and Efficiency Program during the previous calendar year.
 - a. Achieve and maintain total and real water losses less than or equal to 10 percent of the distribution system, unless the Permittee demonstrates using American Water Works Association (AWWA) methods that a higher loss rate is appropriate for the distribution system. The Permittee shall report water losses each year, compare estimated water losses to the goal(s), and briefly describe ongoing or planned water loss reduction measures.
 - b. Maintain average residential per capita daily water use of 110 gallons or less. The residential per capita water use shall be calculated as the amount of water used by residential dwelling units divided by the residential population served. The residential population served can be estimated as the number of residential dwelling units served multiplied by the average persons per household derived from US Census data. Adjustments to account for seasonal or tourist populations can be made, if adequately documented. The Permittee shall report a summary description of status regarding the per capita use goal.
 - c. Initiation or continued implementation and enhancement of a public education and information campaign to promote water conservation and efficiency. The campaign shall consist of activities such as informative billing, periodic mail outs to customers, website announcements, newspaper notices, etc. Public education and information efforts shall be implemented at least annually. The Permittee shall provide a description of the public education and information campaign. The Permittee shall utilize a strategy designed to regularly reach year-round and part-time residents and tourists. The campaign shall consist of newspaper notices and articles, periodic radio and television announcements, periodic mail-outs to customers and the posting of signs and informational brochures in the rooms of hotels, motels and rental property. The campaign shall be oriented to emphasize the program being implemented and water conservation in general, and on at least an annual basis, shall also specifically inform existing customers of ways to save water, ways to detect leaks, reduce demands, enhance efficiency, and detail the automatic irrigation shut-off requirement of Chapter 373.62, Florida Statutes. The Permittee shall provide a description of the public education and information campaign to the District by March 31 st of each year.
 - d. The Permittee shall perform a rate structure evaluation with the intended purpose of creating or maintaining a structure to promote water use efficiency and discourage waste

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while providing for a life-line initial rate. Any refinements shall take into consideration the water use characteristics of the service area and provide financial incentives to customers to conserve and use water efficiently. The Permittee, by March 31, 2023, 2028, and 2033, shall submit to the District the results of the evaluation and a schedule for considering the changes to such a rate structure and a copy of its present/current rate structure as well as analysis and projection of the amount of water projected to be conserved.

10. The Permittee, by March 31 of each year, shall report to the District the following information for the previous calendar year:

11. The Permittee, prior to January 1, 2028, shall evaluate and submit to the District the feasibility of providing reclaimed water within its service area to users that would provide for a direct reduction in groundwater withdrawals. The investigation shall be sufficiently detailed to document the findings of the determination. If determined technically, economically and environmentally feasible, the Permittee shall provide an implementation schedule for supplying the reclaimed water.

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12. The Permittee shall encourage and provide for the efficient and non-wasteful use of water, and shall implement water conservation measures, including a proactive leak detection program, designed to enhance water use efficiency and reduce water demand and water losses.

Standard Conditions

- 13. All water uses authorized by this permit shall be implemented as conditioned by this permit, including any documents incorporated by reference in a permit condition. The District may revoke this permit, in whole or in part, or take enforcement action, pursuant to sections 373.136 or 373.243, F.S., unless a permit modification has been obtained to address the noncompliance.
- 14. The Permittee shall immediately notify the District in writing of any previously submitted information that is later discovered to be inaccurate.
- 15. This permit does not convey to the Permittee any property rights or privileges other than those specified herein, nor relieve the Permittee from complying with any applicable local government, state, or federal law, rule, or ordinance.
- 16. The Permittee shall notify the District in writing within 30 days of any sale, transfer, or conveyance of ownership or any other loss of permitted legal control of the Project and/or related facilities from which the permitted water use is made. Where Permittee's control of the land subject to the permit was demonstrated through a lease, the Permittee must either submit documentation showing that it continues to have legal control or transfer control of the permitted system/project to the new landowner or new lessee. All transfers of ownership are subject to the requirements of section 40A-2.351, F.A.C. Alternatively, the Permittee may surrender the water use permit to the District, thereby relinquishing the right to conduct any activities under the permit.
- 17. Nothing in this permit should be construed to limit the authority of the District to declare a water shortage and issue orders pursuant to Chapter 373, F.S. In the event of a declared water shortage, the Permittee must adhere to the water shortage restrictions, as specified by the District. The Permittee is advised that during a water shortage, reports shall be submitted as required by District rule or order.
- 18. With advance notice to the Permittee, District staff with proper identification shall have permission to enter, inspect, observe, collect samples, and take measurements of permitted facilities to determine compliance with the permit conditions and permitted plans and specifications. The Permittee shall either accompany District staff onto the property or make provision for access onto the property.
- 19. The Permittee may seek modification of any term of an unexpired permit. The Permittee is advised that section 373.239, F.S., and section 40A-2.331, F.A.C., are applicable to permit modifications.

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- 20. The District reserves the right to curtail permitted withdrawal and diversion rates if the withdrawal or diversion causes harm to legal uses of water, offsite land use, or water resources and associated environmental features that existed at the time of permit application.
- 21. The Permittee shall not cause harmful saltwater intrusion. The District reserves the right to curtail permitted withdrawal rates if withdrawals cause harmful saline water intrusion.
- 22. The Permittee's consumptive use of water as authorized by this permit shall not reduce a flow or level below any minimum flow or level established by the District or the Department of Environmental Protection pursuant to Sections 373.042 and 373.0421, F.S. If the Permittee's use of water causes or contributes to such a reduction, then the District shall revoke the permit, in whole or in part, unless the Permittee implements all provisions applicable to the Permittee's use in a District-approved recovery or prevention strategy.
- 23. The Permittee shall mitigate any harm caused by withdrawals or diversions permitted herein on legal uses, offsite land use, and water resources and associated environmental features which existed at the time of permit application. Mitigation may include modification of the Permittee's pumping schedule (i.e., duration, withdrawal rates, time of day, etc.), the lowering of the affected pump(s) or the replacement of the well(s) including proper plugging and abandonment of the well(s) that is replaced. The Permittee, upon receipt of an allegation of interference, shall retain the services of an appropriate licensed professional to investigate the alleged interference. The Permittee shall ensure their chosen professional investigates any alleged interference within 48 hours of the allegation being made and provides the conclusions of the investigation to the entity alleging the impact within 72 hours of the allegation being made. If it is determined that the use of a well has been impaired as a result of the Permittee's operation, the Permittee shall complete the required mitigation within 30 days. The Permittee shall be responsible for the payment of services rendered by the licensed professional. The Permittee, within 30 days of any allegation of interference, shall submit a report to the District including the date of the allegation, the name and contact information of the party making the allegation, the result of the investigation made, and any mitigation action undertaken.

SUBJECT: Overview of the Proposed District/Porter Exchange, Econfina Creek

Water Management Area

Background

The Porter family owns 77 acres (see attached map) in Bay County that fronts Econfina Creek and is bisected by Highway 388. The Porter property is adjacent to the county right-of-way for Highway 388 that is a popular take-out point for canoeists and kayakers; however, this area has never been properly developed or designated for this type of use. This has resulted in a hazardous situation with vehicles parking along the highway in an unsafe manner. To alleviate the congestion and parking along Highway 388, especially in the summer, Bay County desires to acquire property along Highway 388 and develop a public access point.

The Porter family and the District would like to conduct an exchange of properties in hopes of providing Bay County with a site for the desired public access point. The Porter family would exchange the parcels east of Econfina Creek and north of Highway 388 which total approximately 22.5 acres for equally valued District land adjacent to the west boundary of the remaining Porter parcel in the southwest corner of the Econfina Creek and Highway 388 junction. Chapter 373.089, F.S., allows the Governing Board to exchange land and fix the terms and conditions of any such exchange.

Lands Proposed for Exchange

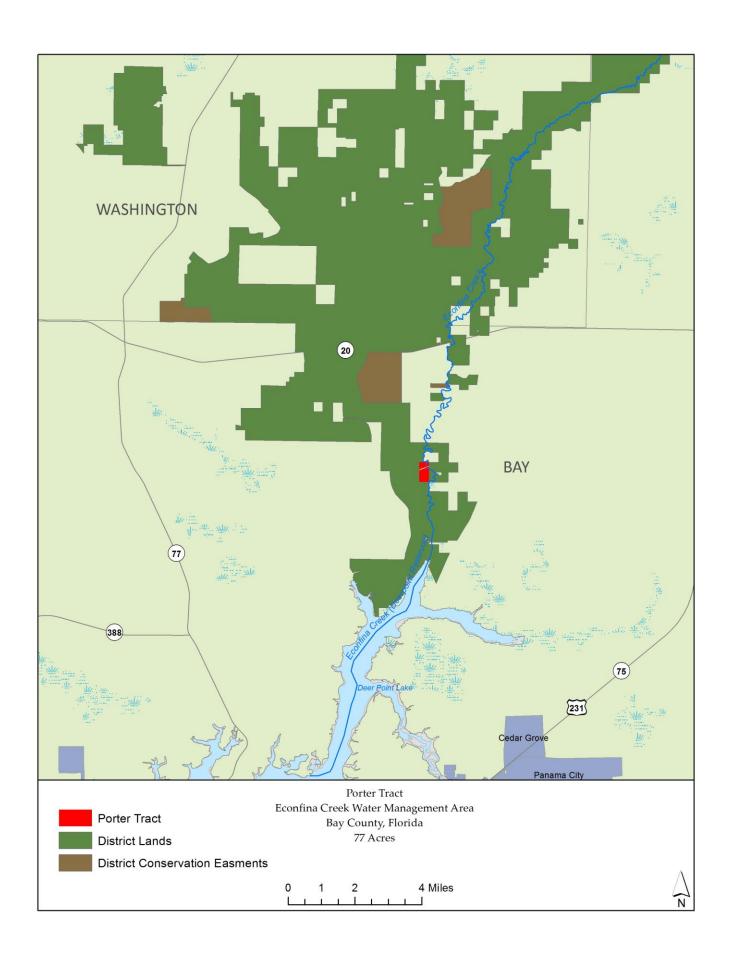
The Porter property has approximately 1,000 linear feet of frontage along Econfina Creek, is bisected by Highway 388 and the entire 77 acres they own is adjacent to District property on all four sides except for the northeast corner of the tract. Of the 77 acres, 22.5 acres is proposed for exchange (see attached map) and provides significant water resource protection to Econfina Creek. The property is predominantly floodplain habitat associated with Econfina Creek. Bay County has indicated the portion of the exchange

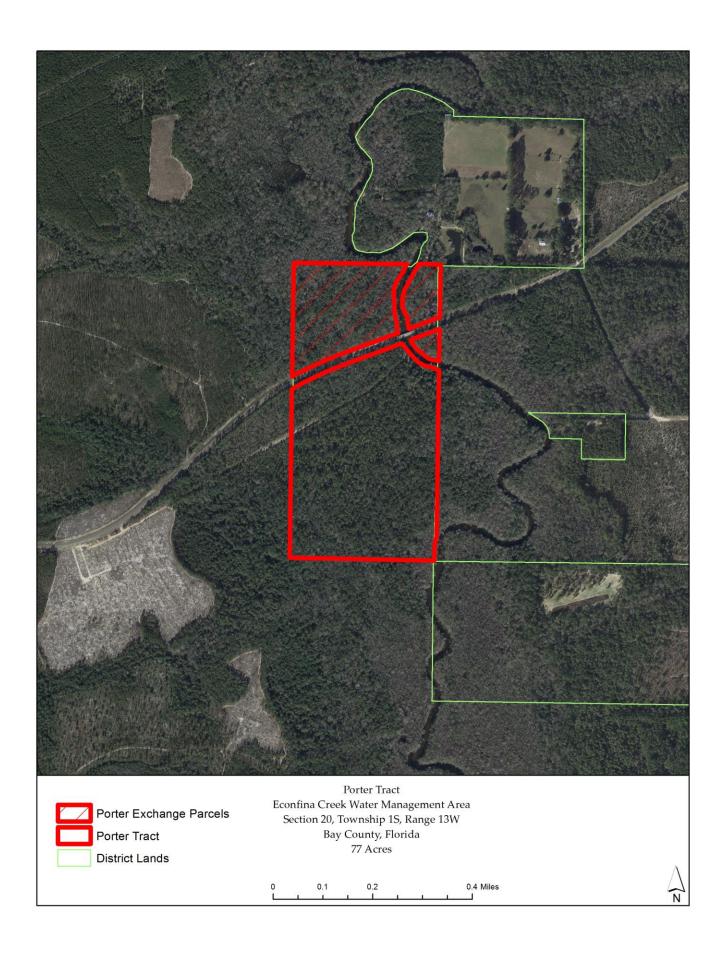
property west of the creek and north of Highway 388 is appropriate for a public access point.

The District property is adjacent to the Porter property on its west boundary, is adjacent to Highway 388 and is predominantly upland habitat. The District parcel proposed for exchange to the Porter family will have frontage along Highway 388 and be adjacent to the remaining Porter property. The District acquired this property in 1997 from Rosewood Timber Company when it purchased almost 30,000 acres for water resource protection and aquifer recharge.

Through this proposed exchange of properties, the District would receive property which offers greater water resource protection to Econfina Creek and would also assist Bay County with the development of a public access point for use by Econfina Creek canoers and kayakers.

CGUPS, LLC, Steven Cox, and Claudia Cox, Petitioners v. Northwest Florida Water Management District and Florida Department of Transportation, Respondents, DOAH Case No. 16-4691

This is a case brought by the Petitioners challenging the proposed issuance by the District of an environmental resource permit to FDOT in Basin 1 of FDOT's project for widening of State Road 390 in Panama City, Florida.

FDOT has filed a modification of its application for an ERP for work in Basin 1 of the overall State Road 390 project. The modified application has been approved and the permit, subject to the Petitioners' challenge, has been issued.

The Administrative Law Judge ordered that the Petitioners file an amended petition and, thereafter, a final hearing will be set. The Petitioners complied with this order. We anticipate the final hearing will be set in April or May, 2018.
