Quick Match Guide



SPRINGS AND ALTERNATIVE WATER SUPPLY FUNDING OPPORTUNITIES

WHAT is match? A project's "match" is intended to reflect how state funding has leveraged local project sponsors and other resources. Applicants are typically required to provide a match equivalent to 100 percent of state funding. There are four types of match:

- a. Cash: A locally secured appropriation or line item fund. Examples include:
 - a. Capital improvement budgets.
 - b. Municipal bonds or other special local appropriations.
 - c. Separately secured grants, e.g., RESTORE funds.
 - d. Legislative appropriations.
 - e. Third party cash contributions.
 - f. Federal and non-DEP state funding.
- b. <u>In-Kind</u>: Human resources time spent in planning, implementation, supervision, and completion activities directly related to the project. In-kind match is subject to review and approval by the District and by DEP.
- c. <u>Companion Projects</u>: The cost of an associated or linked project. Examples include:
 - a. A wastewater treatment plant upgrade required to operationalize a proposed septic to sewer project.
 - b. Costs associated with prior phases of a project *not* funded by DEP.
 - c. The cost of project design, engineering, and permitting incurred.
 - d. Connection fees applied to the project.
 - e. Cost of land acquisition if necessary for project completion, e.g., land purchase needed for a new lift station that cannot be accommodated on the current site (provide demonstration of need) and required to complete the project.
- d. Other: For example, the value of a prior land acquisition needed for and related to the project. Provide copies of closing documents with sales price or market valuation.

Examples above are for *required* match. Additional matching resources above and beyond the minimum requirements are encouraged and will be considered in project evaluations.

What about the Water Protection and Sustainability Program (WPSP) Trust Fund? In addition to typical match funding requirements, if WPSP trust funds are used for a construction project, the WPSP funds cannot exceed 40 percent of the total construction costs.

Funding Needs. Economically distressed and financially disadvantaged communities (i.e. <u>REDI</u>) are encouraged to leverage local commitments, project sponsors, and in-kind efforts; and may request a reduction or waiver of match requirements in the application.
